




Can see countries losing population as a result of emigration.





food shortages, crime, war, floods, lack of services




Why do people move?

Pull Factors forces that draw people to immigrate to a place

Examples political stability, nicer climate, job opportunities, safety

Push and Pull Factors




- lower wages
- crop failure
- poor living conditions
- · poor health and/or education services
- few facilities
- natural disasters
- civil war

- higher wages
- better living conditions
- · better education and health services
- better facilities
- · less chance of natural
- disasters
